The goths must be crazy

When Bevan Chuang spotted a gap in Auckland Museum's schedule she got straight onto proposing an exhibition based on the Japanese gothic Lolita phenomenon.

Called Loli-Pop, the display focuses on Loli-Goths. It includes Japanese Lolita dolls from AUT lecturer Kathryn Hardy Bernal's personal collection.

Typical Loli-Goth attire are bloomers, petticoats, pinafores, ribbons, ruffles, bonnets, lace headaddresses, parasols and Mary Jane shoes.

The display will feature five full-sized garments by AUT University

Fashion staff members Angie Finn, Yvonne Stewart, Lize Niemczyk, Gabriella Trussardi, Carmel Donnelly and Kathryn, demonstrating their interpretations of Gothic and Lolita, inspired by Japanese street style.

Once Bevan, a junior museum employee, decided on the Lolita theme, she found Kathryn to curate it.

"Our ideas received a lukewarm reception at first. People seemed to find it hard to buy into the concept and they couldn't see how it would appeal," says 26-year-old Bevan.

But their relentless faith prevailed. "It's gotten bigger than anyone here expected," she says.

Once they started work on the

exhibition Bevan says they discovered Lolita girls in Auckland.

"They're so thrilled they've been spreading the word on their blogs. I get a text almost every day saying, 'I can help with this' or 'Can I bring my friends along?'. It's just been great."

Bevan hopes the exhibition will have wide appeal.

"We're not only targeting Asians. We hope to attract people from all cultural backgrounds to allow a cultural exchange and to challenge their minds."
